and those who were pleased voluntarily to confer on me the appointments, with the Subscribers in general, to decide from the following sheets.



AN ACCOUNT

OF THE

FIRE AT CHATHAM,

In the outbuildings at the back of two houses in the High-street of Chatham, near the Town Quay, in the occupation of Mr. William Hills a baker, and Mrs. Jane Burdett a tallow chandler, (No. 69 and 70 in the annexed Plan) which in a few hours consumed thirty-four dwelling houses, and materially injured sixteen more; two others were nearly pulled down, to prevent the spreading of the flames, and twelve or thirteen warehouses or outhouses were either destroyed, or seriously damaged; an immense quantity of goods, furniture and other effects, in and about the premises, were either entirely consumed or materially injured, and the total loss was estimated at little less than £100,000. The greatest part of the property was insured in the Hope, Kent, Norwich Union, Phoenix, Eagle, Sun, and West of England Fire Offices; the Hope, in which the Estates of James Best, Esq. were insured, sustaining the greatest loss.

The cause in which the fire originated, or the precise spot in which it began, will always, it is presumed, remain uncertain; it commenced either in the bakehouse of Mr. Hills, or in the adjoining melting-house of Mrs. Burdett, both of which buildings were chiefly composed of timber,

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and filled with articles of a combustible nature, and workmen had been employed therein, till late in the evening on the day previous to the accident. It is imagined, that the strong north-westwardly wind which prevailed the day before, and which, during the night of the fire, blew a hurricane from the river Medway (on the borders of which the Estates were situated), directly on the buildings that were first discovered to be on fire, enlivened the ashes thrown from the ovens or furnaces, and by communicating the fire to the building in which they were deposited, produced the latal catastrophe. Amidst a variety of opinions on the subject, and from the best information that can be gained, nothing like certainty appears, but the prevailing notion, and perhaps the most probable one, is, that the fire began in the bakehouse of Mr. Hills.

It is very consolatory to infer, when reflecting on this melancholy occurrence, that the cause of it was accidental, and not the work of an incendiary; and that neither a single life was lost on the dreadful occasion, nor a person seriously injured in endeavouring to extinguish the flames.

It was a little after two o'clock in the morning when the fire was discovered from the river by one Joseph Joyce a waterman, who immediately rowed his boat on shore at the Town Quay, and gave alarm to the inhabitants; at the same time it was perceived by the sentinel on duty at the Chatham Barrack Gate, who directly communicated the intelligence to Lieutenant Larimore, of the First Royal Veteran Battalion, the officer in semmand of the guard, who immediately beat to arms, hastened to the town with a portion of his guard, and roused the occupiers of the houses in the vicinity of the fire; by these prompt measures the lives of many were alcubiless preserved, as from the decad hour of the night, and the rapidity of the flames, several might otherwise have fallen a sacrifice to the destructive element.

The fire in a few minutes making its progress to the frest of the Highstreet, quickly reached the buildings (No. 19 and 20) on the opposite side of the way, and in the course of half an hour the flames raged with so much violence as to prevent all near approach to them; notwithstanding there was presently gathered together; a great number of very able, active, and enterprising men, who nobly exerted themselves in endeavouring to step the proceeds of the flames, and who were well supplied with water from the river (it being about the time of high water) from the adjoining numps, &c. & the five, however, bade defiance to all human exertions, and rapidly extending its destructive nowers soon enveloped the whole of the houses, contiguous to those in which it began, in a general configuration. At three elelock the scene was terrific in the extreme, and such was the violence of the tempest, that the flakes of fire arising from the consuming buildings were carried by the wind with unparalleled velocity, and of such magnitude, as none but an eye witness can credit; these large flaken communicated the fire to one hay and two com stacks standing in the barn ward of Rome House, belonging to Mr. Best, a distance of four or five hundred yards. The stacks burnt with incredible fury, and served to distract the attention of those who were endeavouring to extinguish the burning houses in the street. Attempts were made in the first instance to save the stacks, but they proved ineffectual, for the wind baffled every effort, carried the embers to Gibraltaz Place, and formed a vast current of fire along the New Road, and even beyond the turnpike gate, a distance of at least a quarter of a mile: every building in that direction was in great danger, and it became necessary to place men on the tops of the houses, buildings, and stacks, with pails of water, to extinguish the glowing embers as they felt. During the conflagration of the stacks, a great quantity of water was thrown from the buckets and fire engines on the adjacent buildings in the burn yard, which were in imminent danger from their contiguity to the stacks, and owing to this precaution they were fortunately preserved; the water cast on them, from the extreme severity of the cold, frose as it fell, and formed an icy surface, which deadened the embers, and prevented any farther damage to the buildings.

About four o'clock the fire appeared at its greatest height; it had not only extended to, but had in a great measure destroyed at very large pile of buildings called the Sun Inn (No. 44), and the intermediate bouses;

so that every hope was now lost of arresting the progress of the allpowerful flames at the Town Quay, which formed an opening or road from the High-street to the river, between the inn and the adjoining house, in the occupation of Mrs. Etherington. The fire raged with increased fury, and soon after spreading to the houses in the tenure of Messrs. Whitehead, Fisher, and Stroughill, and to those on the opposite side of the street, occupied by Mr. Edward Wickham the Confidential Clerk, and Mr. Humphry Wickham the Brewer, of Mr. Best, presently communicated its devouring flames to the elegant and substantial mansion, called Chatham House, in the occupation of Mr. Best; in less than two hours the fire had consumed the interior of that noble edifice, leaving its walls a melancholy heap of ruins. The flames, from some apertures in the walls of Chatham House, then communicated their baneful effects to that part of the adjoining Brewhouse where the steam engine is erected, and which, amidst the surrounding havoc, discharging water at the rate of several tons a minute, had yielded an abundant supply to the engines. At this awful hour, it became doubtful to every person who had a house and family in the town, even at the remotest part of it, whether he should long possess them: every one partook of the wide-spreading fear, that the next hour might witness the destruction of all that was most dear and valuable to him in life. The lamentations and cries of those unfortunate persons who had been so unexpectedly, so suddenly, and so miserably driven from their homes, in a cold, wintry, and tempestuous night, many with no more than the scanty apparel they had, in their great fright, hastily put on, without a home or shelter, to protect them from the "pelting pitiless storm," were shocking in the extreme: the moving of the furniture and effects that were happily snatched, at great risk, from the flames, and carried to the friendly houses of those whose doors were opened to receive the wretched fugitives and their property; the piles of furniture made in the open street, in situations that exposed it almost to as much injury as it would sustain from the flames; and the eager enquiries after the safety and welfare of those who were exposed to the greatest danger, greatly added

to the horror which the heart-reading scene presented. Every one possessed of the common feelings of humanity, was struck with dismay and despair at the appalling sight, and this terror was rendered more awfully visible by the prodigious glare of the flames, which illumined the countenances of those who were present at the awful scene. The sparks issuing from the dreadful crash occasioned by the falling in of the roofs and by the consuming buildings, rose majestically in a shower of fire to an immense height in the air, and mixing thickly with the large flakes of snow and hail that occasionally fell, discoloured, in a remarkable manner, the apparel of those on whom they alighted; many persons, and particularly those who had heroically placed themselves in situations at once difficult and dangerous, were (from their minds being deeply engaged in the awful events, in which they were the principal actors) insensible of the different temperatures to which they were exposed; one moment suffering the effects arising from the scorching heat, and the next experiencing the intense cold of a severely freezing atmosphere. At this critical juncture, a few daring men, with a courage and intrepidity which will always redound to their credit, bravely, nay rashly, and at the hazard of their lives, placed themselves in a dangerous situation between Mr. Best's house and the adjoining brewhouse; the debt of gratitude is justly due to them from the inhabitants in general, but more particularly from Mr. Best and his friends; since by their united exertions, with a plentiful supply of water from buckets, engines, &c. and through the merciful interference of a kind Providence, they happily prevented the flames from spreading in the brewhouse, which was already on fire in several places. Their noble exertions were aided by the unusual thickness and solidity of the walls of Chatham House, which notwithstanding the intensity of the heat to which they were exposed (china, iron, silver, &c. melting into one common mass in the interior of the building) now appeared a ruinous heap indeed, but yet well able to withstand and form a powerful barrier to the violent impetuosity of the flames, and the raging tempest by which they were assailed; from the resistance they afforded, the contiguous browhouse, offices, and outbuildings, less solid, yet more extensive, and the valuable property they contained, were rescued from destruction.

The situation of Chatham House being in the immediate direction of the wind, and the flames being thereby arrested in their dreadful progress by its substantial walls, a good opportunity was afforded for many persons to yield greater assistance in extinguishing the flames in the houses burning at the other extremity of the fire, and by the great exertions and zealous endeavours of as brave a set of men as ever contended with so formidable an assailant, the rapidity of the flames was checked about seven o'clock in the morning, though it was nine before they were subdued, and noon before the fire was safely extinguished. As a proof of the intensity of the heat of this fire, it is necessary to state, that at the end of five weeks after it happened, some of the timbers on removing the ruins were still burning, and the coals in the collars were red with heat.

It would be an invidious task to name those inhabitants who were most active in endeavouring to extinguish the flames, it is therefore hoped it will be sufficient to say, that one and all seemed to vie with each other in rendering their utmost services on the distressing occasion. It is at the same time proper to state that they were well supported by Col. Pasley with the officers and men of the Sappers; by Sir Archibald Christie with the officers and men of the first Veteran Battalion; by many officers of the Royal Marine Corps with their men; by Capt. Parry of the Royal Marine Artillery and his men; by Major Hay and Capt. Somerville of the Honourable East India Company's service with their men; and by Brigade Major Holland: many officers of the Royal Navy with the crews of their respective ships arrived with alacrity and used their best endeavours not only in preventing the progress of the flames, but in preserving the property of the unfortunate sufferers by removing it to places of safety and placing guards to protect it from the unhallowed hands of the pilferers, who then appeared.

The engines of the Dock Yard, Ordnance, and Victualling Office, were also promptly forwarded by the Commissioner Sir Robert Barlow, John Baillie and Henry Stokes, Esqrs. which afforded great assistance.

A painful but necessary task yet remains to be performed, that of recording the villary of those wretches undeserving the names of men, who, during the awful visitation, under the pretence of yielding assistance to their fellow creatures in the hour of distress, took the base and cowardly advantage of their sufferings, by pillaging their houses and secretly embending their property. Several of these unprincipled beings were apprehended and carried before the Magistrates, who kindly offered their services and cheerfully gave their attendance and assistance on the melancholy occasion, and many were, after a strict examination into their nefarious conduct, committed to prison to answer for crimes for which language has hardly a suitable epithet; at the ensuing Assizes sixteen of them were tried, convicted, and sentenced to various terms of imprisonment; a few were acquitted, more from some defect in the evidence than from their own innocence; and several escaped the punishment which their infamous conduct justly merited.

To alleviate the pangs of misery and soften the anguish of distress, occasioned by this dreadful calamity, a meeting in Vestry of the parishieners was called on Tuesday the 7th of March, to take into consideration the most effectual means that could be adopted for the relief of the unfortunate sufferers. The meeting was numerously and respectably attended, and the following resolutions were entered into on the occasion.

" Resolved Unanimously,

- "That a subscription be immediately opened, and made, from house to house, throughout the Town and Parish, to effect the above laudable purpose.
- "That application be made to the Commissioner and Principal Officers of his Majesty's Dock Yard at Chatham, the Principal Officers of the several Public Departments there, and likewise to the respective Mayors, Magistrates, Ministers, &c. of the several cities, boroughs, towns, and parishes in the county, stating the abovementioned calamitous affair, and supplicating their aid by a similar subscription.
 - "That a Committee from the Principal Officers of His Majesty's Deck

Yard at Chatham, the Officers of the several Public Departments there, and the Corporation of Rochester, and also one or more Gentlemen from the neighbouring Parishes be, and they are hereby requested to assist the Committee appointed for this parish, in examining the Claims of the Sufferers, and granting such relief as circumstances will allow, and the nature of the case may require.

- "That the Committee do meet at the Vestry Room on Thursday the 10th instant, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to receive statements of the Losses sustained by those persons who are desirous of receiving relief from the subscription, and that public notice be immediately given of such meeting.
- "That such statements be forthwith examined, and distribution made by the Committee of the money collected, in such manner as shall be judged expedient, and will best tend to alleviate the miseries of the unfortunate.
- "That the following Gentlemen be, and they are hereby appointed a Committee for this parish:—

"That Mr. W. Jefferys be, and he is hereby appointed Treasurer and Secretary, and that subscriptions be received by the Committee, the Treasurer, and at the several Banking Houses in the County.

"The Chairman having left the Chair, Mr. T. H. Hooper took the same, and

" It was resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the Chairman for his able conduct in the chair."

A collection was immediately made by several gentlemen of the Committee from house to house throughout the Town of Chatham, excepting the houses of those gentlemen who belonged to his Majesty's Dock Yard, who it was understood had previously determined to make a collection for the general fund among themselves; this they did in a very laudable manner,* and the liberality of those characters as well as of the towns people is recorded in the following sheets, and deserves the utmost thanks of those to whose use it was applied.

[•] All classes of workmen in the Dock Yard cheerfully contributed their mite to the fund for the relief of the sufferers by the fire, except the Ropemakers; but why that useful body of men withheld their assistance on the trying occasion remains to be explained, particularly as several of them were sufferers by the fire: the Committee, however, were not negligent or unmindful of their claims, but treated them with the same kindness and liberality as those of the other sufferers.

Letters were also addressed, by Mr. Drage, to several public characters residing in the county, who, it was imagined, had the power and inclination to further the views of the Committee, by augmenting the subscriptions; and these applications, it will appear, were not made in vain.

The cities, and most of the towns and parishes in the county, adopted the same line of conduct as that pursued by the Chatham Committee. particularly the city of Rochester, the principal characters of which formed themselves into a Committee, and dividing into separate parties, solicited subscriptions from house to house throughout the city, the parish of St. Margaret's, the precincts of the Cathedral, and the neighbouring parishes of Strood and Frindsbury. The Members newly-elected to represent that ancient city in parliament (namely Lord Dinning and Ralph Bernal, Esq.) each contributed 250. The collection exceeded the most sanguine expectations; and it is but a tribute of justice due to a free and generous people to declare, that, in general, no work of charity was ever performed with more cheerfulness and liberality than this, particularly when the severity of the times, and the many privations under which several of the donors laboured, are taken into due consideration. The meed of gratitude is justly due to them from the sufferers, and doubtless fills the heart of many, if not of all of those, who have been so bountifully and seasonably relieved by the kindness of their benefactors.

On the 10th of March, a Notice was published and distributed about Chatham and the neighbouring Parishes, as follows:----

" FIRE AT CHATHAM.

"Such persons as are desirous of receiving relief from the subscriptions now making for the Sufferers by the late Dreadful Fire, are requested to send a statement of their respective losses, well authenticated by two or more respectable persons, to the Committee Room of the Poor House of the parish of Chatham, on or before Saturday the 18th instant, directed to

such Committee, that they may, as soon as possibly convenient afterwards, examine and decide upon the same.

"10th March, 1820."

The claims of the sufferers by the Fire were examined, and their names arranged in alphabetical order, in books provided by the Committee, the amount of their loss was inserted, and such property as consisted of stock in trade, furniture, and apparel, was distinguished from cash, watches, plate, trinkets, books, &c.; which latter property was justly deemed articles of luxury, rather than of necessity; the claims of those who sought relief for the loss of goods which they had deposited with Mr. Thomas Frid and Mr. Asher Cohen, two pawnbrokers, whose houses were totally consumed, and the greater part of the effects therein destroyed or damaged by the fire, were laid aside for a time in order to investigate the demands of those persons whose more immediate wants entitled them to speedy relief. Accordingly notice was published and distributed in manner before-mentioned, whereby the sufferers at the late fire were desired to attend on the following Monday (March 26), at Sir John Hawkins's Hospital, which on application by the Fire Committee was kindly lent to them to transact their Business in, by the Trustees of that Charity. The claimants were also required to bring regular statements of the value of the articles they had lost, and to render such information as the Committee desired respecting their situations and circumstances in life, the means they possessed of supplying their present wants, and of alleviating the hardship they experienced, on account of the late calamitous event.

The Committee accordingly met at the time and place appointed, and for several successive days, and examined the parties respecting the claims they had made, and their situations and prospects in life; they arranged the claims in due order, and made necessary observations thereon. In some of the claims were inserted articles of apparel, trinkets, furniture, &c. which the Committee deemed to be rather ornamental than useful, and notwithstanding the parties in all probability did possess them at the time



the fire happened, and by means of it were deprived of the same, yet however praiseworthy it might have been in the party obtaining them by their own industry and care, the Committee, in performing a work of charity instituted for the relief of the immediate necessities of the destitute, did not think themselves authorized to replace such articles, and particularly as they were incompetent to decide what was exactly suitable to the situations and conditions in life of the several claimants; and if the Committee had exercised a discretionary power on the subject they would have been accused of partiality; they therefore formed a table or standard by which the articles of dress and furniture were to be estimated, taking care that a sufficient sum should be allowed for re-purchasing those articles that were deemed fit and necessary for persons, who stood in need of relief, and as distressed objects sought it at the hands of the public. The Committee having taken this preliminary step, proceeded to place the claimants in distinct classes, allowing to those in the first class the full claim they had made, (subject to a correction, if necessary, by the above-mentioned standard, as to the value of the effects lost) as persons deserving of the greatest relief, and as being real objects of charity; a second class was established with an allowance of fifteen shillings in the pound on the claims admitted by the Committee; a third with ten shillings; a fourth with seven shillings and sixpence; a fifth with five shillings; a sixth, for those persons who in the opinion of the Committee were not entitled to a place in either of the above classes; and lastly, a column was left, in which those persons names were placed, who were considered as objects not intended by the subscribers to participate in their bounty. The names of these persons were, from time to time, moved from one class to another, as the Committee obtained information respecting the justness of the claim, their characters, and other circumstances that would necessarily induce them to vary the class.

After these accounts were arranged, the Committee proceeded, in like manner, to examine, arrange, and register, in alphabetical order, the claims delivered on account of the losses sustained by those, who had pawned their



effects at Mr. Frid's or Mr. Cohen's, and having ascertained the amount, they requested Mr. Drage to address a circular Letter to the several persons and parishes, to whom, and to which, he had previously written, on behalf of the sufferers, to state the amounts of the claims made, and to entreat them to remit to the Treasurer the monies received. The following is a copy of the Letter:—

"SIR,—The Committee appointed to investigate the claims of the unfortuate sufferers, by the late dreadful Fire at Chatham, and to distribute the money subscribed for their relief, request me to inform you, that they have received and examined the claims of sundry persons, residing at or near the place where the fire happened, who have applied for relief, and find the same amount to the sum of £5290. 10s.; and have also received claims to the amount of nearly £1400. from several persons who have applied for relief (most of whom are in very indigent circumstances), that have suffered by the above-mentioned calamity, from their goods being either burnt, destroyed, or lost, with the Estates lately occupied by Mr. Thomas Frid, and Mr. Asher Cohen, Pawnbrokers, which were totally destroyed by the said fire, together with the greatest part of their effects, and who are not accountable to such sufferers for the property pledged.

"The Committee are very desirons to alleviate the immediate wants and necessities of the distressed sufferers, on as early a day as possible; and, therefore, have requested me to apply to those Gentlemen who have already received, and not remitted, or who may hereafter receive any subscriptions for the above-mentioned benevolent purpose; and to beg that they will have the goodness to remit the amount to the Treasurer, Mr. Jefferys, Solicitor, at Chatham, on or before the 12th day of April next, that the Committee may correctly ascertain the amount, and duly apportion and distribute the same amongst the sufferers without delay.

"Permit me to solicit your attention to the above request; and to say, that your compliance therewith will be esteemed a favor by the Committee.

The answers to these letters convinced the Committee that the Fund raised by the several subscriptions would not only enable them to alleviate the immediate distress which the sufferers had sustained by the fire, but would also be sufficient to relieve the wants of those who had lost their goods, which they had pawned with Messrs. Frid and Cohen. With a view, therefore, of accomplishing that object, the Committee, on the 5th of April, caused the following notice to be published, and distributed through Chatham and the neighbouring parishes:—

" PAWNS.

- "This is to give Notice, That the Committee appointed for the distribution of the money subscribed for the relief of those persons who suffered by the late dreadful Fire at Chatham, will meet at Sir John Hawkins's Hospital, in Chatham, on Friday the 7th instant, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, when the several persons whose apparel, goods, &c. were in pawn, and actually destroyed by such fire, who are desirous of absention respecting their situation and circumstances in life, to enable the Committee to class their claims, preparatory to making a distribution of the money raised for the relief of the sufferers by the said fire.
- "N.B. To prevent confusion the several persons whose surnames begin with either of the first twelve letters of the alphabet, are desired to attend at ten o'clock; and the other persons whose surnames begin with the subsequent letters, at one o'clock precisely.

" April 5, 1820."

And on the 10th of the same month the following notice was in the like manner printed and published:—

" PAWNS.

"This is to give Notice, That the Committee appointed for the distribution of the money subscribed for the relief of those persons who

suffered by the late dreadful Fire at Chatham, will meet at Sir John Hawkins's Hospital, in Chatham, on Friday the 14th instant, when the several persons whose surnames begin with the letters L M N O P and Q are requested to attend at ten o'clock in the forenoon; and those whose surnames begin with R S T V U W X Y and Z, at two o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, whose apparel, goods, &c. were in pawn, and actually destroyed by such fire, who ARE DESIROUS OF RECEIVING RELIEF from the subscription, and have delivered a particular of their claims to the said Committee on or before the 5th instant, and give information respecting their situation and circumstances in life, to enable the Committee to class their claims, preparatory to making a distribution of the money raised for the relief of the sufferers by the said fire.

" April 10, 1820."

Many of the persons who had made claims not attending to substantiate the same, the following notice was, on the 15th of April, printed and distributed:—

" FIRE AT CHATHAM.

"This is to give Notice, That the Committee appointed for the distribution of the money subscribed for the relief of those persons who suffered by the late dreadful Fire, will meet at Sir John Hawkins's Hospital, in Chatham, on Wednesday the 19th instant, when the several persons who have made claims for, and ARE DESIROUS OF RECEIVING RELIEF, from the subscription, but have not already attended to substantiate their claims, are desired to attend as follows:—Those whose surnames begin with the letters A B C and D at ten o'clock precisely in the forenoon; E F G H I and K, at twelve o'clock at noon; L M N O P and Q, at two o'clock in the afternoon; and those whose surnames begin with R S T V U W X Y and Z, at four o'clock in the afternoon of the same day; and give information respecting their situation and circumstances in life, to enable the

Committee to class their claims, preparatory to making a distribution of the money raised for the relief of the sufferers by the said fire.

" N. B. No claims will be attended to after that day. "April 15, 1820."

Notwithstanding these notices, many of the claimants neglected to attend the Committee and to substantiate their claims, and frequently made it a matter of complaint, that some unavoidable necessity had prevented them; they repeatedly solicited individuals of the Committee, particularly the Treasurer, to admit their claims in private, and suffer them to receive a dividend in common with others, without the trouble of attending a public investigation. Many of these fair dames, who had, without the knowledge of their husbands, pawned their effects for unworthy purposes, requested this indulgence to save themselves (as some of them allowed) that well-merited chastisement which their thoughtless and imprudent conduct had rendered them liable to; but a deaf ear was turned to all such applications; the Committee would in no wise become parties to such an iniquity; but in order impartially to give an opportunity to every one of substantiating their claims, and partaking of the charitable fund, the following notice was published and distributed by order of the Committee on the 26th of April:—

" FIRE AT CHATHAM.

"Notice.—Such persons as have delivered in claims to the Committee appointed to distribute the money raised by the subscription for the relief of the sufferers by the late dreadful Fire, and have not attended to substantiate their claims, and who ARE DESIROUS OF RECRIVING RELIEF from the subscription, are hereby required to attend at Sir John Hawkins's Hospital, in Chatham, on Tuesday next, the 2d day of May, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of substantiating such claims, or they will be precluded the benefit of the subscription; the Committee having

determined to strike out those claims from their list, if not duly substantiated on that day, and to make a distribution of the money collected, without further delay.

" April 26, 1820."

From the time the claims on account of the pawns were delivered. until the month of May, the Committee were busily engaged in arranging the same, and making enquiries into the situation and circumstances in in life of the respective claimants; but foreseeing no speedy termination to their labours, they resolved to relinquish the former intention of going through the claims of those who had lost their property at the pawnbrokers, before they made a distribution to the immediate sufferers; they therefore determined to convene a meeting of the general Committee, and to submit the arrangement they had already made with respect to the sufferers claims; the classes in which they had placed them; the sums allotted to such of them as they thought were objects worthy of relief; and the rejection of these claims which they conceived did not fall within their notice. Accordingly on the 16th of May a meeting of the general Committee was held in the Vestry Room of the parish church of Chatham, when the Sub-Committee made a Report of their proceedings to the general meeting, and requested their decision and order for payment of the sufferers; the several claimants names were then read over separately, their situation and circumstances in life were detailed; the nature, extent, and character of their respective claims were made known, and the observations of the Sub-Committee thereon; the sums allotted to the sufferers, and the rejected claims were openly declared; and the whole taken into the serious consideration of the general Meeting, who delivered their sentiments thereon; and where any difference of opinion prevailed, which was in very few instances indeed, the same was decided by a majority of votes. The sums stated in the first column of payments made to the sufferers, were on the 23d of the same month paid to them respectively, or such of them who applied for the

same; and these who did not, were subsequently paid on demand the sums allotted to them.

The Sub-Committee then proceeded in their tedious and unpleasant task of examining the persons who had suffered by the loss of their goods being destroyed by the fire in Messre, Frid and Cohor's shoos: they resumed their enquiries into the condition and circumstances in life of the claimants, as well as the mature and extent of their loss. On these occasions they had to meet with statements of losses of coats of superfine cloth, very few of them (if the persons were to be believed who made the claim) the werse from wear: these were valued at £3, £4, or £5, and every other article of apparel was genegally estimated in the same proportion. Watches, both gold and silver, were claimed, many of the former were valued at \$20, £30, or £40, and few of the latter at less than £5, with chains and seals half the value of the watch. Persons sought relief for the loss of silk, sattin, and velvet dresses, pelisses, jewels, pearls, bracelets, ornaments for the person of pure virgin gold, trinkets and other fancy articles of immense value; quadrants, telescopes, pictures, books, furniture of a description fit for a nobleman's house, articles of every kind that the mind can imagine, both small and great, were boldly declared to have composed the stock of Mr. Frid and Mr. Cohen, at the time the fire happened: it was no uncommon thing for £20 to be claimed for a Bible; the like sum (little more or less) was demanded for histories and other books. which the claimants had taken in by numbers, and pledged for a tenth or a fifth part of their estimated value; yet, on examining Mesers. Frid and Cohen on this linteresting subject, with a desire to ascertain the truth of the reprecentations made by, and render justice to, the claimants; the former person declared that he solemnly believed that he had advanced full two-thirds of the value of every article that had been payned with him; and the latter avowed that, on an average, he had advanced money in the proportion of three fourths of the intrinsic ralue of the goods which had been deposited with him in pledge. The essertions of Messes. Frid and Cohen were in a great measure corresponded from the following circumstances observable on many of the claims made, and the duplicates produced in support of them; it

appeared that when a person pawned his coat, watch, or other valuable article, of the estimated worth by the sufferer of £3 or £4, for a pound note; if it became necessary for him to obtain five shillings more, he did not raise this additional sum on the article originally pledged, and make the aggregate sum received on it twenty-five shillings; but he produced another article (according to his own estimate), of nearly three times the value, to obtain the last mentioned sum; and so, from time to time, as often as he wanted an additional sum, he always produced an additional property; whereas, it is evident, that it would have been quite as easy, and more convenient for the borrower, to have received an additional sum on the article first pawned; and quite as beneficial, and less troublesome for the pawnbroker, to make a farther advance upon the first article alone, if it was a sufficient security to him.

The claimants produced the duplicates, containing an account of the effects pledged, to the Sub-Committee, who strictly examined them respecting the same, and the value they had put on those articles that were lost or destroyed by the fire; and, although many of the statements were attested, as required, by persons of the first respectability in the Town, yet the contents were of that nature that they could not gain credence with the Sub-Committee, who were compelled to have recourse to the method of establishing a standard, by which every article lost or destroyed should be estimated, and its value ascertained. This was a work of much labour and great fatigue, and, in the performance of which, the Committee discovered great fraud; for they, on examining the parties, and the duplicates, had returned the latter to their owners, at their solicitation, that they might deliver them up to Mr. Frid or Mr. Cohen, should the article therein enumerated be found, and restored to them, before a distribution was made of the subscription money. Several articles being, from time to time, discovered at the pawnbrokers, or brought in from persons who had secretly embezzled, and conveyed away the same; this circumstance fully justified the Sub-Committee in yielding to such solicitation. Yet this indulgence was so grossly abused, in many instances, as to be made the means of fraud, the duplicate being passed

from one part of a family to another of the same name; or, if that could not be successfully effected, to another, whose maiden name was the same, or who had a father, mother, uncle, aunt, or grandfather or grandmother, of a name similar to that written on the duplicate; and under cover of this trick. new claims were made for the same articles twice, thrice, and, in one instance, four several times. The infamous imposition, however, was at length betraved. by arranging the names strictly alphabetically, and particularly by observing in one claim, an article of an unusual description, which appeared in all the claims made by persons of the same surname. This discovery occasioned a third, fourth, fifth, and, in some cases, a sixth examination of the accounts delivered, and much time was thereby consumed: at length, if not a complete account, a much more correct one was obtained. Several schemes were then proposed to do justice to the claimants demands, in proportion to their real losses; but this was a task attended with great difficulty, and it was found, on trial, that none could be accomplished with the desired effect. The value set on the article lost by the claimant could not be depended upon; the pawnbrokers could not render any thing like a just estimate of their worth; indeed, that could not have been reasonably expected, from the innumerable articles deposited with them; the sums advanced on the pawns appeared to yield no criterion of their value; and no opinion could be formed from the size of the claimant's family, or circumstances in life. The Committee were then driven to the only expedient they conceived left, which was, that a sum should be allowed to every deserving claimant, in proportion to the amount he had received on making the pledge; but, as it was considered that there was a difference between a person pledging his apparel, or the necessary articles of life, and the pawning of others, which, however useful or ornamental, did not fall within the former description, they resolved, if the funds would permit it, to allow every deserving claimant a sum equal to that which he had received on pawning the former articles, and half that which he had received on pledging the latter. They, however, provided, that no sum exceeding £10 should be awarded to any one; that claims, which appeared exorbitant or improper, should be rejected; and that those persons, whose conditions in

life did not justify the delivery of any claim, should receive none, or only a partial relief.

It cannot perhaps be successfully contended, that this plan afforded what may be termed strict justice to all the claimants—but it was a case of extreme difficulties: I firmly believe that none but the most correct intentions actuated the Committee in their decisions, but they could not do impossibilities. It is also feared that there are certain poor creatures who have been but very scantily relieved for the loss they have sustained; while there are others who have received more than the value of that property, which, if the fire had not happened, they never would have redeemed. It is an unpleasant reflection that this may have been the case in some unavoidable instances, but I hope they are few, and that they will not become a matter of reproach: the best means, under the peculiar circumstances of the case, were adopted; and the Committee rely, with confidence, on their own consciousness of endeavouring to do what was right, and on the candour and kindness of the public in general, for giving them credit for the exertion of their best endeavours.

Claims to the number of 220 and upwards remaining unsubstantiated on the 22d June, the following notice was printed and published through Chatham and the neighbourhood, to which was annexed a list of the mames of those persons who had not substantiated their claims:—

" PAWNS.

"This is to give Notice, That the Committee appointed for the distribution of the money subscribed for the relief of those persons who suffered by the late dreadful Fire at Chatham, will meet at Sir John Hawkins's Hospital, in Chatham, on Monday the 3d day of July next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, when the several persons whose names are hereunder written, and who have already made and delivered in their claims to the Committee, on account of their apparel, goods, &c. being in pawn, and actually destroyed by such fire, are requested to attend and give information respecting their situation and circumstances in life, to enable the

Committee to class their claims, preparatory to making a distribution of the money raised for the relief of the sufferers by the said fire, otherwise such claims will be totally rejected.

" June 22, 1820."

Upwards of 140 claims remaining unsubstantiated on the 11th August, and the Committee being anxious to afford the several claimants the benefit of the subscription raised for their relief, caused a similar notice to be published and distributed in the Town and neighbourhood of Chatham, to which were added the names of the persons with whom the goods lost or destroyed were pawned; the sum at which they were valued by the sufferers; the amount for which they were pledged; and the names of the persons who had attested their respective statements.

The Sub-Committee met at the several days and times mentioned in the above-mentioned notices, for the purpose of receiving the information thereby required, but few claimants attended; and the Committee, finding that no good was likely to arise from appointing other days for that purpose, and that every delay was an injustice to those who had complied with their requests, and substantiated their claims, they called a meeting of the General Committee, at the Vestry Room of the parish Church of Chatham, and laid the result of their labours before them; and the same measures were pursued with respect to the claims for pawns as had been observed with regard to the sufferers at the fire—and a distribution was ordered accordingly.

On the 6th of September the following notice was published and distributed as before:—

" FIRE AT CHATHAM.

" This is to give Notice, That the Committee appointed for the distribution of the money subscribed for the relief of those persons who suffered by the late dreadful Fire, will meet at Sir J. Hawkins's Hospital, in Chatham, on Monday and Thursday, the 11th and 14th; and Monday and Tuesday, the 18th and 19th instant, when the several persons who have made claims for, and ARE DESIROUS OF RECEIVING RELIEF from the subscription, and have substantiated their claims, are desired to attend as follows:—All those who have pawned any goods at Mr. Frid's, on Monday the 11th instant, at ten o'clock precisely in the forenoon; and those who have pawned goods at Mr. Cohen's, on Thursday, the 14th, whose Surnames begin with the letters A B C D E and F, at ten o'clock precisely in the forenoon; G H I K L M N and O, on Monday the 18th instant, at ten in the forenoon; and P Q R S T V U W X Y and Z, on Tuesday the 19th instant, at ten o'clock precisely in the forenoon, to receive and give discharges for the sums allotted to them by order of the said Committee.

"N.B. No claims will be paid other than to the principals, and therefore no wife for her husband, or friend for a sufferer, will be allowed to receive the same.

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"Sept. 6, 1820."

Upwards of 220 persons, who had attended and substantiated their names, neglecting or refusing to attend the meeting appointed, and to receive the money allotted to them; the Committee thought it advisable to publish the names of those who were in that situation, and on the 29th of September, they caused the following notice, to which were added the parties' names, to be printed and published as before:—

" FIRE AT CHATHAM.

"This is to give Notice, That the Committee appointed for the distribution of the money subscribed for the relief of those persons who suffered by the late dreadful Fire, will meet at Sir J. Hawkins's Hospital, in Chatham, on Tuesday, the 24th of October, 1820, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, when the several persons whose names are hereunder written, and who have made claims for relief from the subscription, and have substantiated their claims, are desired to attend and receive the same, otherwise their claims will be absolutely rejected.

" N. B. No claims will be paid other than to the principals, and therefore no wife for her husband, or friend for a sufferer, will be allowed to receive the same.

"29th September, 1820."



Notwithstanding every means were thus made use of to induce the characters to come forward and receive the sums allotted to them, a great number remained unpaid, which may be seen by a blank line in the following statement, made opposite to the sum ordered to be paid to them. Several of them, no doubt, had their goods restored, and therefore did not attend to claim relief for their supposed loss. Others had too much pride to condescend to attend and receive the money granted to them, whilst some few who had left the place might, possibly, be ignorant of the proceedings; but the major part of the unsatisfied claims, it is feared, was founded on duplicates which had been previously exhibited, and which, on the payment of the sums allotted to the claimants, were given up to the Sub-Committee, and destroyed by them; hence they could not be produced at the pay-table to support a second claim. In every case in which the duplicates were lost or destroyed by accident, and a reasonable account was rendered of them, supported by the oath of the person who lost or destroyed the same, the parties were relieved. In this manner the claimants were paid the sums awarded to them, and the amount was placed against their respective names.

The Treasurer continued to pay all those who came to his office, and who could give a reasonable and satisfactory excuse for their non-attendance at the advertised meetings of the Committee, until the end of the year: he then made up his accounts, and the balance remaining in his hands (after

paying the expences) was ordered by the General Committee to be applied for the relief of the sufferers, except those who had pawned their effects, as appears in the second column opposite their respective names, and this was accordingly done.

The claimants in general received the sums allotted and paid to them with thankfulness, and evinced their gratitude by a respectful behaviour to the Sub-Committee; but a few, and I am happy to say a very few indeed, conducted themselves in a very rude and unbecoming manner, offering the grossest insults to the Sub-Committee, and, with much abuse, complaining of the sums ordered to be paid them. In two or three instances this ill conduct was carried to such an extreme, that the Sub-Committee found it necessary to turn the parties away with none, or only a part of the sum allotted to them. Whatever the Committee granted, ought to have been claimed with civility, and received with respect.

The Sub-Committee baving with much labour and pains performed the arduous task assigned to them, received the thanks of the Committee in general for their services, and were dissolved.

I shall always consider the manner in which the office of Treasurer and Secretary was conferred upon me by the Committee, as a mark of their confidence and respect; and I should take much blame to myself if I let this opportunity pass without returning my best and unfeigned thanks to the Sub-Committee, who so promptly afforded me every assistance in their power, in discharge of the great duties which the office imposed on me; and I must here particularly mention the unwearied assiduity, and unremitted attention of the Rev. A. Brown, who, from his rank in life as a Magistrate, well knew the character and circumstances of several of the claimants, and, by those means, had an opportunity of checking the fraudulent and unjust claims of many of the unworthy, and of supporting the cause of the modest and distressed. I must likewise mention the Rev. Mr. Drage, Capt. T. Mould, Mr. Dickens, and a few other gentlemen, who embarked with me in the laborious affair; and who, by their kind, efficient, and valuable services,

enabled me to bring it to a conclusion; which, I trust, is fair and just, if not satisfactory to all.

Although the great Fire which happened on the 30th of June, 1800, was less extensive and destructive than this, which happened on the 3d of March. 1820. still it was more calamitous in its consequences; because the latter affected persons who were better able to sustain the loss; whilst the former extended its destructive influence to the more needy and distressed. The real misery in 1820 was not so great as in 1800, and although the effects pawned were nearly four times greater in quantity, and six in value, yet I think it would be better, in the event of a similar calamity (which Providence avert), to confine the relief to those persons who may become sufferers by the immediate consequences of the fire, and who may become houseless and destitute from its effects, rather than to extend it to those whose property may be destroyed in the possession of a pawnbroker. I speak not of the trouble of investigating, and the uncertainty, I had almost said impossibility, of arriving at a just conclusion as to the extent of their real claims, or of detecting the frauds that may be but too successfully practised in many cases; for these difficulties and evils, perhaps, ought not to be mentioned on so melancholy an occasion, but rather to be met with patience and fortitude, and, if possible, to be combatted and overcome; but still, relief afforded to many of these unfortunate creatures, tends to encourage practices, which I think (from the experience I have had on occasion of both ares) are fraught with much mischief, and render but little real service in the end. I admit, however, that there are a few cases in which the relief afforded has been attended with great and good consequences, and these cases ought to weigh heavily in favor of relieving in future such distress; but, after a due deliberation upon both sides of the question, I must anequivocally declare this to be my unbiassed opinion, that the evils arising from these well-intended acts of charity preponderate, and encourage a propensity to fraud and imposition, which ought to be opposed and suppressed by every means in our power.
